#### Report of the directors (incorporating the trustees' report) For the year ended 31st October 2017

The directors present their reports and their financial statements for the year ended 31st October 2017. The directors who are also trustees of Caithness Broch Project for the purpose of charity law and who served during the year and up to the date of this report are set out on Page 1.

#### Objectives and activities

The overall objective of the Caithness Broch Project is to raise the potential of Caithness as a viable heritage tourism destination, and, thus, improve the region's economic sustainability. Caithness Broch Project seek to achieve this through outreach events - to help build both tourists and locals awareness and interest in the archaeological landscape of Caithness - as well as through promotion, such as use of social media, to help market the area.

As per Caithness Broch Project's articles of association:

PART 2 COMPANY'S OBJECTS AND POWERS AND USE OF ASSETS Objects 3. The company's objects are specifically restricted to the following charitable purposes:- 1. The company has been formed to promote the benefit of the public within Caithness by advancing education, community development, heritage and culture by working with individuals, local groups and agencies in Caithness, and encouraging people to learn about, record, and become involved in their heritage through -

- (a) Providing opportunities for all ages and abilities to learn about the rich archaeological heritage of their communities.
- (b) Developing an understanding of the archaeological heritage through recreating a broch(s) or other structures
- (c) Recording the past, with photographs, drawings, plans or memories, to be made as widely available as possible on websites, and local archives.
- (d) Offering a range of activities to suit all interests and to allow progression including courses, above ground surveys, excavation, post excavation activities and archival research, working in partnership with other groups and societies.
- (d) Providing tools and knowledge to enable people to make quality contributions to and to manage their local heritage.
- (f) Working with other individuals, organisations, museums, schools and projects to further the above aims of the Caithness Broch Project.

#### Achievements and Performance

Between the period 31st Oct 2016 and 31st Oct 2017 was undoubtedly a busy and successful period for Caithness Broch Project. During this time we:

- Fundraised and organised the 'Caithness Broch Festival', a series of archaeological events and activities at two broch sites in Caithness, in which over 150
- participants joined. For many volunteers this was their first experience of getting directly involved with field archaeology.

   Produced 2000 copies of the Caithness Broch Trail leaflet, promoting some of Caithness' lesser-known broch sites. During this period we also installed the first of 3 interpretation panels for these sites, at Achvarasdal Broch.
- · Organised a 4-day coastal survey with 'Scotland's Heritage at Risk Programme' with over 60 volunteers
- · Saw the creation of our LEGO Broch and 'Home of the Broch' exhibition at Caithness Horizons. The exhibition attracted over 4000 visitors across 3 months.
- In August 2017 we spoke with over 750 pupils from local schools about brochs, in a mix of digital outreach events (using Minecraft to build virtual brochs) as well as more hands-on events. The event was a marked success
- · Attended dozens of shows and talks to promote the project, as well as appearing in numerous forms of media from BBC Radio to The Times newspaper.

#### Financial Review

Total income during the year was £40,690, expenditure was £34,023 leaving a surplus of £6,667. We carried forward reserves of £12,192 of which £6,192 were unrestricted for the continuation of our projects and events and sustainability of the charity. The £6,000 of restricted funds are to be used towards the Caithness **Broch Project** 

#### Structure, Governance and Management

The charity is constituted as a company limited by guarantee and is governed by its Memorandum and Articles of Association.

The methods used to recruit and appoint new charity trustees are identified in the Memorandum and Articles of Association.

#### Notes to financial statements For the year ended 31st October 2017

#### 1. Accounting Policies

The principal accounting policies are summarised below. The accounting policies have been applied consistently throughout the year. There are no material uncertainties about the charity's ability to continue. The charity is a public benefit entity.

#### 1.1 Basis of Accounting

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard FRS102 (effective January 2016) and the Companies Act 2006. Assets and Liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction valued unless otherwise stated.

The presentation currency of these accounts is in pounds sterling.

#### 1.2 Income recognition policies

All incoming resources are included in the statement of financial activities when the charity is entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy. The following specific policies are applied to particular categories of income:-

Voluntary income is received by way of grants, donations and gifts and is included in full in the statement of financial activities when receivable. Grants, where entitlement is not conditional on the delivery of a specific performance by the charity, are recognised when the charity becomes unconditionally entitled to the grant.

Donated services and facilities are included at the value to the charity where this can be quantified. The value of services provided by volunteers has not been included.

Income from investments is included in the year in which it is receivable.

#### 1.3 Expenditure

Expenditure is recognised on an accruals basis as a liability is incurred. Expenditure includes any VAT which cannot be fully recovered, and is reported as part of the expenditure to which it relates.

Costs of generating funds comprise the costs associated with attracting voluntary income and the costs of trading for fundraising purposes.

Charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its activities and services for its beneficiaries. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly to such activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them.

## 1.4 Fund Accounting

Unrestricted funds are those available to use at the discretion of the Directors in furtherance of the general objectives of the charity and which have not been designated for other purposes.

Designated funds are those unrestricted funds which have been set aside by trustees for an essential spend or future purpose.

Restricted funds are funds which are to be used in accordance with specific restrictions imposed by donors or which have been raised by the charity for particular purposes.

## 1.5 Tangible Fixed Assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life as follows:

Freehold Buildings Straight Line over 50 years

Leasehold land and buildings Over the lease term
Plant and machinery Over 5 years

Fixtures, fittings, tools and equipment Over 5 years Computer Equipment Over 3 years

#### 1.6 Transition to FRS 102

This is the first year in which FRS 102 has been adopted. The date of transition is 1 October 2016. \* Funds of £6,000 was received from Foundation Scotland towards the Caithness Broch Festival which was a series of archaeological events and investigations held throughout the following year.
